MEMBER ENGAGEMENT AND VALUE DELIVERY

In 2025, BCCGA conducted a comprehensive member feedback survey to assess our value delivery, understand member priorities, and guide strategic planning. The survey yielded 16 responses from diverse stakeholders across utility and energy companies, construction firms, regulatory organizations, and industry associations across British Columbia.

Member Familiarity and Engagement

Survey results demonstrate strong member familiarity with BCCGA's mission, with 69% of respondents rating themselves as "very" or "extremely" familiar with organizational activities. Members showed highest engagement with Contractor Breakfasts (9 participants), committees (9 participants), and Member Meetings (8 participants), reflecting the value placed on technical education and networking opportunities.

Program Relevance and Impact

Half of all respondents rated BCCGA's programs as "extremely relevant" to their organizational needs, with an additional 43% rating them as "somewhat relevant." Members identified Contractor Breakfasts, legislative advocacy, and April Safe Dig events as the most impactful initiatives. Networking opportunities and the April Safe Dig Awareness Campaign received top ratings from 10 members each, followed by industry advocacy (9 members) and regulatory updates (7 members).

Communications and Advocacy

Member engagement with BCCGA communications remains strong, with 93% of respondents engaging with organizational communications regularly, and over 50% engaging "always" or "almost always." Three-quarters of members feel BCCGA effectively represents their interests in industry and regulatory discussions, while 63% perceive BCCGA as delivering equal or higher value compared to other industry associations.

ORGANIZATIONAL TRANSFORMATION AND RENEWAL

2025 marked a year of significant organizational development as BCCGA systematically strengthened its operational foundation, governance structure, and service delivery model to better serve members and advance damage prevention outcomes across British Columbia.

Governance Restructuring

BCCGA implemented a new governance model featuring a smaller, more agile board structure designed to enable faster decision-making and more responsive leadership. This restructuring enhances our ability to address emerging industry challenges, capitalize on opportunities, and maintain strong strategic direction while ensuring effective oversight and stakeholder representation.

Enhanced Program Delivery

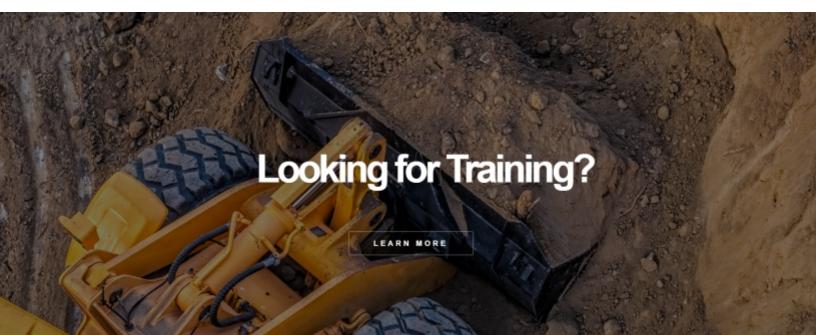
Our program offerings were reimagined and enhanced to better align with member needs and industry best practices. This included strengthening our Contractor Breakfast series with more targeted technical content, expanding regional programming reach, and developing new training modules. These improvements reflect member feedback calling for enhanced collaboration with key stakeholders including BC 1 Call, ICBA, FortisBC, BC Hydro, Trans Mountain, Enbridge, and regulatory bodies.

Communications and Member Engagement

BCCGA revitalized its communications strategy to ensure timely, relevant information reaches stakeholders when needed most. Enhanced digital communications, improved member outreach, and more frequent touchpoints have strengthened relationships and increased member participation in programs and initiatives. Member feedback indicated 63% interest in contributing to committees or working groups, signaling strong commitment to collaborative engagement.

Our social media presence has grown steadily thanks to a dedicated strategy that has already increased membership to over 270 LinkedIn followers and boosted engagement across our platforms. With a clear campaign goal of reaching more than 1,000 followers by mid-2026, we are calling on all members to help amplify our message—share our posts with colleagues, follow our updates, and actively engage in our damage prevention community. Together, we can expand our reach, strengthen connections, and build a more informed and proactive network.

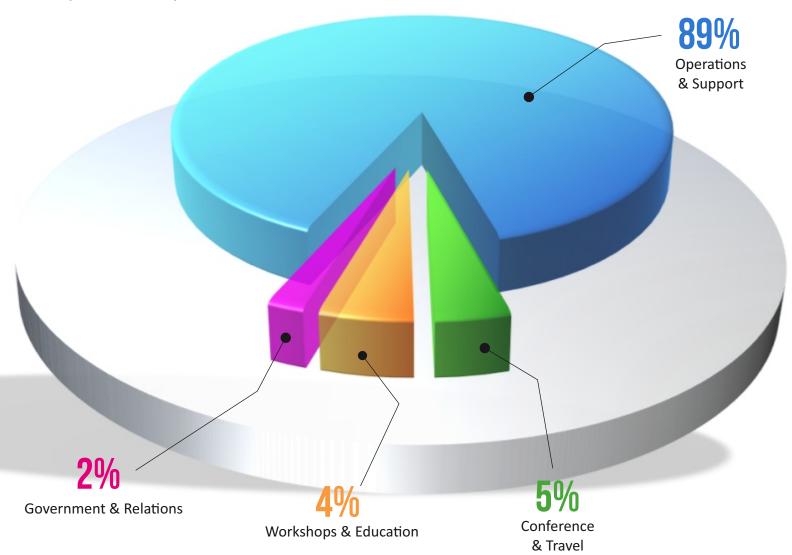

2024 CANADIAN DIRT REPORT HIGHLIGHTS

The Canadian Common Ground Alliance's 2025 DIRT (Damage Information Reporting Tool) Report, analyzing 2024 data, demonstrates meaningful progress in British Columbia's damage prevention efforts while highlighting persistent challenges that require continued attention and collaborative action.

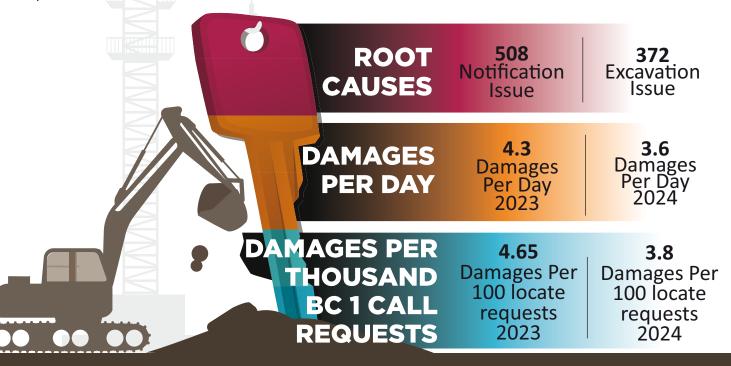
British Columbia achieved a 16% reduction in reported underground infrastructure damages in 2024. This marks the third consecutive year of improvement and represents a 27% reduction since 2020, demonstrating the effectiveness of ongoing damage prevention initiatives and stakeholder collaboration across the province.

Persistent Challenges

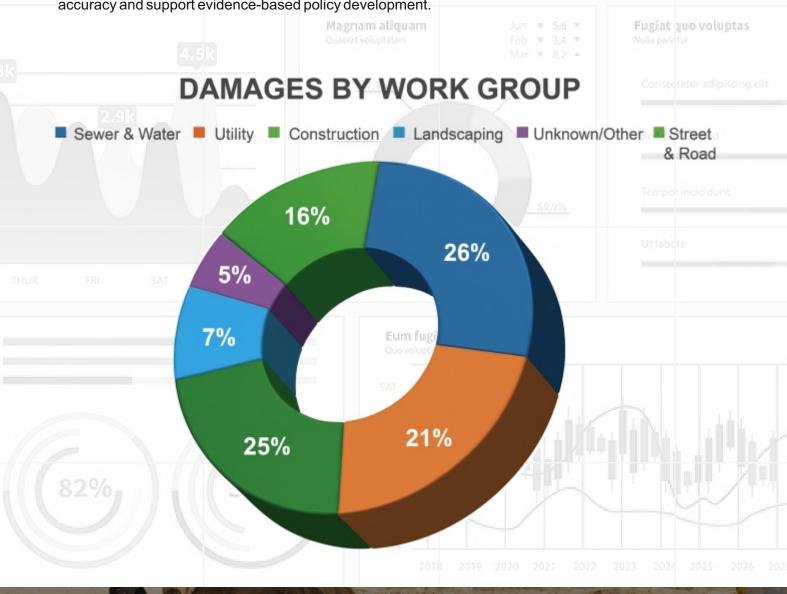
Despite progress, significant safety concerns remain. Fifty-five percent of BC's reported damages (509 incidents) were attributed to failure to call BC 1 Call before digging, and 98% of these "no locate" damages involved natural gas facilities, creating serious public safety risks.

These findings underscore the critical need for enhanced public awareness, stakeholder engagement, and potential legislative measures to ensure compliance with damage prevention protocols.



Data Quality and Reporting Limitations

The DIRT Report relies on voluntary participation which creates inherent limitations in data comprehensiveness and representation. Underreporting bias, particularly among stakeholders involved in damages, means actual incident numbers exceed reported figures. Enhanced data collection mechanisms and broader stakeholder participation will strengthen future reporting accuracy and support evidence-based policy development.

LOOKING FORWARD: 2026 AND BEYOND

Strategic Priorities for 2026

BCCGA's 2026 priorities reflect member feedback and emerging industry needs. Key focus areas include expanding regional programming, particularly Contractor Breakfasts in Prince George and Fort St. John; enhancing collaboration with BC1Call, utilities, and regulatory bodies; strengthening contractor oversight and locating documentation quality; and expanding outreach to those outside the BC1Call system. These initiatives directly address member-identified gaps and opportunities for enhanced damage prevention impact.

Sustained Funding and Financial Stability

The consistent support from WorkSafeBC and member organizations provides stable financial footing for 2026 and beyond. This funding confidence affirms that BCCGA's strategic direction is sound and our value proposition is clear. Responsible stewardship of these resources, combined with enhanced operational efficiency, enables continued investment in programs, services, and initiatives that deliver tangible value to members and measurable improvements in damage prevention outcomes.

Enhanced Training and Education

Expanding training standards remains a cornerstone of BCCGA's 2026 strategy. Plans include updating certification programs, enhancing existing technical training modules, and leveraging technology to reach broader audiences across the province. These initiatives respond to member demand for high-quality professional development opportunities and support industry-wide competency enhancement in damage prevention practices.
